

Manager's Report

I can't believe I am saying this, but happy holidays from Williamson County Landfill! It's hard to believe that 2025 is coming to a close. To part ways with this year and celebrate the arrival of a new one, I'd like to highlight a few things happening at the landfill and in the community, as well as a few

on the horizon for 2026.

Things have remained relatively quiet on the landfill side over the past few months. Recently, we began planning a landfill gas infrastructure project to improve gas collection. We anticipate the project to be completed by the end of December. In the first quarter of 2026, we will begin constructing a new cell. Work has continued in the pollinator garden at the landfill entrance. The volunteers planted 38 new plants in November to increase the variety of blooms throughout the year and provide more food for pollinators. They also spread wildflower seeds in bare spots to encourage new growth.

We've also been busy supporting our community. In October, we accepted 15,100 lbs of materials as part of the Great Hutto Clean Up. Additionally, we welcomed 452 vehicles to our Hazardous Household Waste (HHW) event at the Williamson County Central Maintenance Facility. We will announce our next HHW event in our spring newsletter. Last but not least, you can bring your Christmas tree to the landfill for mulching December 26 - January 4. We will accept trees for free during regular business hours. They must be live trees and have no ornaments, flocking, lights or tinsel.

From all of us at the landfill and the recycling facility, we wish you a safe and joyful holiday season. As we reflect on the year, we're especially grateful for the strong partnerships we've built with our community. Your continued support and engagement make our work at Williamson County Landfill possible. Stay safe, and we look forward to connecting with you again next year.
