

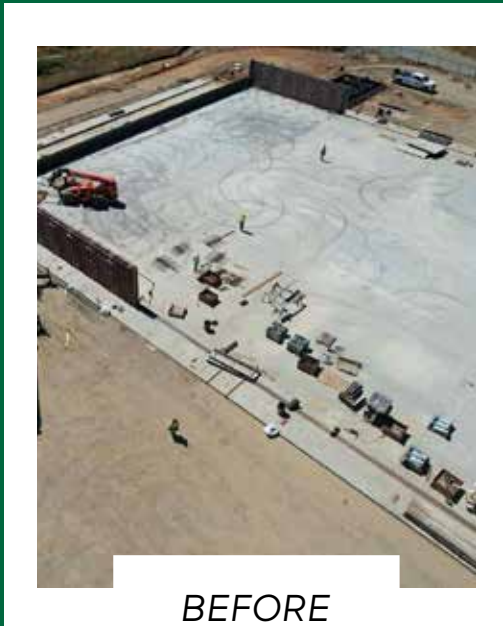

Moving Along: McCourtney Road Transfer Station Reaches New Milestone

The McCourtney Road Transfer Station Renovation Project continues to make significant strides. Following months of meticulous work on the building pad, footings, push walls, and loading bay, the project has reached another key milestone.

The construction team is now focused on assembling the new premanufactured building and erecting steel structures, which will expand the facility's capacity to four operational scales. This upgrade aims to enhance customer experience and streamline access to material unloading stalls. Although substantial work remains, the project is on track for completion by January 2025. This will coincide with the launch of curbside collection for food scraps, food-soiled materials, and yard waste in the region, in compliance with California's Senate Bill 1383. Food Scraps Collection Update

By January 2025, following the completion of the McCourtney Road Transfer Station renovation project, Nevada County residents and businesses will be required to comply with Senate Bill 1383. This legislation mandates the sorting and separate collection of food scraps, food-soiled paper, and yard debris from regular trash and recycling. However, Nevada City residents and businesses will not see a change in collections as the City of Nevada City has received a low population waiver from CalRecycle that exempts this collection through at least March of 2027.



Why Organics Collection Matters?

Sustainability

We can significantly reduce harmful methane emissions by diverting organic waste from landfills. Organic material can also be repurposed as compost and green energy, contributing to a cleaner and more sustainable environment.

Compliance

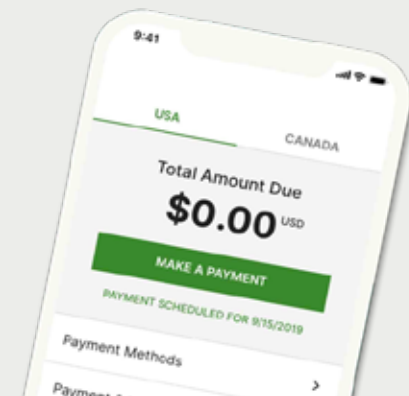
California's SB 1383 has set ambitious goals to address climate change and reduce food waste. Under the new regulation, residents and businesses across the state are required to have organics service and sort food scraps, food-soiled paper, and yard waste.

Local Job Generation

Expanding material recovery operations to handle organic waste leads to the creation of more job opportunities at processing facilities and for local collection drivers.

Alternative to Home Composting

Although home composting is encouraged, the organics recycling program will accept additional types of organic materials that are not suitable for composting in your backyard.
