Proud to Service Palmdale

WM and the City of Palmdale are proud to present you with this updated service guide to your trash, recycling, and organic waste collection services.

Service Overview

Businesses and multifamily properties must subscribe to recycling, organic waste, and trash collection services unless issued a waiver by the City of Palmdale as noted below.

Recycling and Organics Regulations for Businesses and Multifamily Properties

Recycling Collection

Per Assembly Bill 341, California's Mandatory Commercial Recycling law, businesses that generate at least four (4) cubic yards of solid waste, or multifamily properties with five or more units must participate in a recycling program by subscribing to recycling services or self-hauling recyclables to an approved facility. To assist businesses and multifamily properties in complying with AB 341, WM is proud to offer commercial recycling services for Palmdale businesses and multifamily complexes at a reduced rate. Containers are available in various sizes. Roll-off containers and compactor services are also available.

Organic Waste Collection

Also, in accordance with State Senate Bill 1383, California's Short-Lived Climate Pollutants Reduction law, businesses and multifamily properties must participate in a program to recycle their organic waste (food, food-soiled paper and green waste) by subscribing to organic waste recycling service, self-hauling organic waste to an approved facility or receiving a waiver from the City of Palmdale. To assist businesses and multifamily properties in complying with SB 1383, WM is proud to offer organic waste recycling services to meet your needs.

City of Palmdale - Commercial Generator Waiver Program

State regulations allow the City of Palmdale to grant participation waivers to qualifying businesses and multifamily properties for lack of generation, alternative service, or physical space constraint. Bulky Item Collection

WM is proud to offer bulky item collection to multifamily residential properties, such as apartments, condos, and townhomes as follows:

- Multifamily properties with cart service Customers are entitled to four (4) bulky item pickups of up to four (4) items per year at no additional charge.
- Multifamily properties with dumpster service Customers are entitled to one (1) pickup per dwelling unit in the complex, or building, per year at no additional charge. Each pickup may have up to four (4) items each.

Additional pickups or additional items per pickup can be arranged for a nominal charge.

Acceptable Bulk Items - Furniture, appliances, electronic waste, tree branches, clothing and scrap wood.

Non-acceptable Bulk Items - Household hazardous waste (such as paint, oil, and batteries), spas, pianos, camper shells, and items requiring more than two persons to safely handle.

Regular commercial accounts may also schedule a bulk item pickup through your My WM account or online at **www.wm.com/us/ en/home/bulk-trash-pickup** for \$28.98 per pickup.

Holiday Schedule

Waste collection does not occur on the following holidays:

New Year's Day | Memorial Day | Independence Day Labor Day | Thanksgiving Day | Christmas Day

When a holiday falls on a weekday, collection will be delayed one day for the remainder of the week. If a holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, there will be no delay in service.





Tier One & Tier Two Edible Food Generators

As part of SB 1383, edible food generators (considered Tier 1 and Tier 2) must recover the maximum amount of edible food that would otherwise be disposed of, by arranging food recovery through a contract or written agreement with food recovery organizations or services, and maintaining food donation records.

Tier 1 - Effective January 1, 2022

- Food Distributors
- Food Service Providers
- Grocery Stores and Supermarkets (10,000 square feet or greater)
- Wholesale Food Vendors

What is Contamination and Overfilling?

Contamination occurs when non-acceptable materials are placed in the wrong container. This can damage processing equipment, harm employees, and turn recyclables or organics into trash.

Overfilling happens when a container is filled with too many materials, preventing the lid from closing completely. As a result, material falls out when the container is being emptied.

Why Your Participation Matters

Properly managing contamination and overages is essential for every business. Ignoring contamination can result in higher service costs due to contamination fees, potential service interruptions if containers cannot be serviced, and non-compliance with regulations like SB 1383.

Similarly, failing to address overages can lead to increased costs from overage fees, pose health and safety risks to customers, employees, and WM drivers, and harm your business's community image.

By staying proactive and ensuring proper waste management practices, businesses can save money, maintain compliance, and contribute to a cleaner, safer community.



- Healthcare Facilities with an on-site food facility and 100 or more beds.
- Hotels (with at least 200 rooms and an on-site food facility)
- Large Venues/Events (2,000+ daily visitors)
- Local education agencies with an on-site food facility
- Restaurants (5,000 square feet or greater or seating more than 250)



Overage and contamination fees are currently set at \$96.20 per instance. Repeated violations can result in significantly higher costs and may require mandatory service level adjustments to ensure compliance.



How to Establish a Successful Recycling and Organics Program

1. Confirm you have service. WM offers free onsite or virtual visits, assessments, and technical assistance. Let our trained staff help you set up your programs and determine the correct container sizes and service levels to maximize diversion, ensure compliance and be cost-effective.

2. Train and educate employees, tenants, residents, and customers to properly sort all waste. SB 1383 regulations require businesses and multifamily properties to provide education on proper waste sorting. WM offers resources such as guidance on container setup and signage to help ensure compliance and reduce contamination. 3. Sort waste into proper containers. AB 827 regulations require businesses to provide "front of the house" recycling and/or organics containers and informational signage for customers, visitors, and employees to collect recyclables and organic waste from products purchased on the premises. Materials should go into the correct containers to avoid contamination.

Why SB 1383?

SB 1383 aims to slow climate change by diverting organic materials from landfills, recovering 20% of edible food, and redirecting it to food-insecure Californians. Disposing of organic waste rather than composting it creates 20% of California's methane emissions. Methane is a climate super pollutant and is 84 times more potent than carbon dioxide.
