Local Scouts Conserve Wildlife by Collaborating with Waste Management's El Sobrante Landfill

Boy scouts from Murrieta and Temecula will work together to protect the endangered burrowing owl species

April. 24, 2012, Temescal Valley, CA - Over 50 boy scouts will participate in a two-day conservation project event to help build underground burrows in the El Sobrante Wildlife Preserve to increase the population of the rare burrowing owl.

The burrowing owl, once common throughout Riverside County, is facing a rapid decline due to various environmental factors. The owl's habitat is open grasslands, and it nests in underground burrows dug out by other animals, such as the ground squirrel. Although active both day and night, the bird is rarely spotted.

Waste Management has committed more than 650 acres of its El Sobrante Landfill area to a permanent wildlife preserve. Besides the burrowing owl, other endangered and protected species that live in the wildlife preserve include the coastal California gnatcatcher and stephen's kangaroo rat.

El Sobrante staff works closely with conservation land managers from the Riverside County Habitat Conservation Agency (RCHCA) towards efforts to conserve thousands of acres along the Lake Matthews area for the protection of many animal and plant species. The burrowing owl conservation project is a joint effort to increase the population to at least five in the Lake Matthews region.

With the assistance of RCHCA staff and the El Sobrante biologist, the boy scouts will build six underground burrows, in which the owls and their descendants can use for years. A biologist will monitor the area to measure the success of the burrows.

"The underlying theme of this event is to engage youths through awareness and teamwork, while providing them the opportunity to execute environmental solutions in collaboration with experts like our El Sobrante biologist and RCHCA staff," said Miriam Cardenas, Community Relations Specialist. "Together, the boy scouts are building homes for owls that need their help, which is a commendable example of environmental stewardship."
